# HISTORY OF ST. LOUIS,

## PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE.

---

In the following sketch of the history of St. Louis, we have confined ourselves to only the essential points, giving, in a concise and condensed form, merely a simple statement of facts. The space in the present volume would not admit of a more elaborate and highly embellished historical description. We have, therefore, collected from reliable data, and presented as briefly as possible, all the most interesting features of the rise and progress of the Metropolis of the Great West.

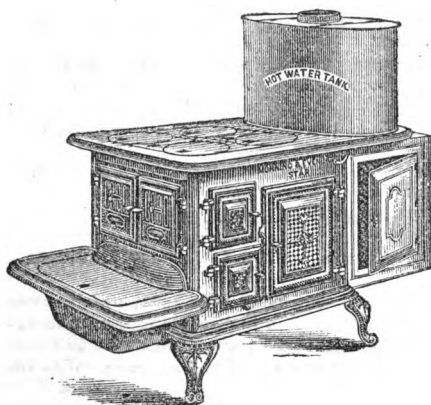
St. Louis was first located and settled by a Frenchman named Pierre Liquest Laclède, who, together with several others, composed what was styled the "Louisiana Fur Company." Authority was granted them, in the year 1762, by Gen. D'Abadee, then Governor-General of "Louisiana," to establish posts for trading with the Indians west of the Mississippi. After exploring for some time, Laclède selected and took formal possession of the present site, in February, 1764, and named it "St. Louis." In 1766, the grant for the land was given Laclède, upon which he commenced to build. The Valley of the Mississippi belonged to France, and was known as "Louisiana," the northern part of which was called "Upper Louisiana," or "The Illinois," the seat of government being located at New Orleans.

Louisiana was ceded to the United States in 1803. All of that portion north of the 33d parallel bore the name of "Missouri Territory." The first legislature was convened at St. Louis in 1816.

In 1804, the French village was transferred to the American authorities, having a population of less than one thousand inhabitants. The only money used, or currency circulated, was deer skins. There were but three short, narrow streets in the town, Fourth street being the outside boundary. The houses were principally built of logs. There were only two American families residing at that time in the town. In little over half a century, therefore, St. Louis has reached its present magnificent greatness (if we may use the term), counting a population of not less than 245,000 souls.

The present valuation of taxable property in the city is upwards of \$180,000,000. At no time in the existence of St. Louis has building increased so rapidly as during

the past two years, when there were erected no less than eleven hundred fine, substantial, and some really magnificent stores and private dwellings, besides a vast number that were enlarged and improved.

The geographical position of St. Louis, in a mercantile point of view, will unquestionably render it the Grand Centre of the inland towns of the Union, and at no very distant day destined to become, as from its natural advantages it should, the great metropolis of America. No better site for the American capital could possibly be selected. Commanding the trade of the three great arteries of the continent—the Ohio, Mississippi, and Missouri rivers—also, the main railroads diverging at this point to all parts of the country, from the Atlantic to the Pacific ocean, gives to St. Louis the enjoyment of advantages unsurpassed, or even equalled, by any other city, and which must of a certainty give her the palm of superiority over all others. The natural resources of the State of Missouri, with its inexhaustible store of mineral wealth, as yet in its infantile development, must necessarily make St. Louis the great mart, eventually, for the supply of those staple commodities, iron, lead, zinc, coal, etc. Untold wealth is here, in and around St. Louis, together with the solid capital already in the hands of its leading business men, whose untiring energies and capacities, ambition and natural pride, all tend to press that inevitable result.

The present system of numbering the houses in the city was adopted by an ordinance of the Common Council, and approved December 18th, 1866.

The numbering of all houses fronting on public streets in the city of St. Louis shall be in conformity to the following rules, to wit: the odd numbers apply to the north and west sides of the streets, the even numbers to the south and east sides. Market street is the dividing line north and south, at which line numbering begins and increases at the rate of one hundred for each block.

On all streets running in a westerly direction from the river, numbering begins at the wharf in like manner of one hundred to each block. The general rule being that one hundred numbers shall represent each block going west from the river, also the same north or south from Market street.

## **Public Parks and Squares.**

The various parks that adorn the city, although not so numerous or as extensive as some, will compare favorably with those of any Western city.

### **LAFAYETTE PARK.**

The finest in the city, is located in the southwestern part of the city, bounded as follows: by Mississippi avenue on the east, Missouri avenue on the west, Park avenue on the north, and Lafayette avenue on the south. It contains an area of twenty-eight acres. The commissioners have preserved and improved by artificial means the natural features of the grounds, planted many new, and some rare species of trees, laid out the walks and avenues to advantage, beautified the plats with a variety of flowers, also an abundant supply of clear, cool water. On Thursday afternoons the city furnishes music free, thus rendering the park a delightful resort for the citizen or stranger with their families. The grounds are well policed, and ladies and children unaccompanied by the male portion of the family can here find recreation unmolested, by improper characters.

The park can be reached by the Fourth street and Chouteau avenue (yellow) cars, direct to the gates, also by the Tower Grove and Lafayette park (red) cars from Fourth street, also by the Lindell R.R. Co.'s (blue) cars to within two blocks of the park.

### **HYDE PARK.**

Situated on an elevated plat of ground west of the Bellfontaine road, on Salisbury street. The Union R.R. Co.'s (yellow) cars from Fourth and Locust streets run direct to the gate, also Bellfontaine R.R. Co.'s (red) cars, from Fourth and Washington avenue, or the Fifth street line, St. Louis R.R. Co.'s (yellow) cars. The park has as yet not been completed, though it is at present a great resort of the public and pic-nic parties. Music, dancing, and other amusements, and refreshments, are at all times to be had. Great numbers resort here to enjoy the delightful breezes and shade of the stately oaks.

### **MISSOURI PARK.**

Or Olive street park, as it is sometimes called, is situated on Olive and Thirteenth streets, running through to Locust and Fourteenth streets, although small, is a fine spot of ground, tastefully laid out.

### **WASHINGTON SQUARE.**

Situated on Twelfth and Market, to Clark avenue, is at present in a primitive state. It has been only partially laid out, for the purpose of building the City hall thereon, though it is now a great place of resort for the citizens of the neighborhood.

### **CARR SQUARE,**

On Sixteenth and Carr streets, has also been neatly and tastefully arranged, containing a fine fountain in the centre, shade trees, etc.

**GRAVOIS AND LACLEDE PARK,**

In the southern part of the city, are as yet in an unfinished state.

**ST. LOUIS PLACE PARK,**

Near the new Reservoir, between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, will also be at no distant day, a fine park, though but little has as yet been done towards completion.

**MISSOURI BOTANICAL GARDEN,**

Or Shaw's Garden and Park, a description of which will be found elsewhere.

## **The Fair Grounds.**

To give a full description of the beautiful Fair Grounds of the "St. Louis Agricultural and Mechanical Association," in a work of this size, would be impracticable—they must be seen to be appreciated.

The grounds have been vastly improved by the addition of hundreds of choice trees and plants, the laying out of walks and drives, the erection of beautiful and convenient buildings, the introduction of artificial ponds, mounds, &c.

At the Fair of 1859 several representatives of the Eastern press were present, who had attended fairs all over the United States, and many in Europe. They pronounced this the most handsome amphitheatre, and, as a whole, these the most beautiful and complete Fair Grounds they had seen anywhere. Since then, nine years' growth and beauty has been added to the various imported trees and shrubs, thousands of dollars have been expended in ornamenting and perfecting the grounds and buildings; and as long as any improvement can be suggested, the company will have the money to make this, and to maintain it, the best Fair Grounds on this continent.

"Fair week" is the gala season, not only for St. Louis, but for the people within a radius of hundreds of miles. Railroads and steamboats bring persons at half fare, and the city is a vast swarm of exhibitors and sightseers from all the country around. During some days there have been present at the Fair Grounds 80,000 persons within the inclosure at one time. Every year the attraction is made greater by the more liberal premiums offered, and the greater variety of articles included in the competition. The benefits, or premiums, are not confined to this city or State. Every year premiums are borne away to other and distant States.

The Fair Grounds at present embrace eighty acres, bounded by Grand avenue, Kossuth avenue, College avenue, and St. Charles plank road. The grounds can be reached by the cars on Franklin avenue, on Fifth street, from the corner of Washington avenue and Fourth, or from Locust and Fourth streets.

The Amphitheatre, by far the largest in the United States, will seat comfortably 12,000 people, upon seats raised one above the other, so that all can see. Around these seats (one above them and the other below) are two promenades, each of which

will hold 12,000 persons. Thus it will be seen that this immense structure will shelter as many as 36,000 people. Under the Amphitheatre are eighty-one booths, at which visitors can be furnished with refreshments at all times.

In the centre of this building is the Pagoda, around which all the fine stock will be exhibited, and in it a full brass band performs during the exhibition. The Pagoda is forty-five feet high, has three stories, and is built in the most beautiful and ornamental style.

The Floral, Mechanical, Fine Art, and Textile Fabric Halls, are all spacious, and admirably adapted to the exhibition of such articles as may be exhibited in those departments.

The new Mechanical Hall, built of brick, is in the shape of a Maltese cross, with two wings, one running from north to south, the other from east to west, measuring 200 feet across and 50 feet wide. There is a rotunda in the centre 75 feet high and 48 feet in diameter. The hall has 48 windows, each 5 by 12 feet. The rotunda has 16 windows, giving light to all parts of the house. Each wing is supplied with a number of ventilators.

The Machine Shop is brick, 82 by 250 feet, and 25 feet high. It has two boilers, and a 75-horse power engine.

The Gallinatum, thirty feet in diameter, three stories high, is made entirely of wire, and contains ninety apartments, with all the conveniences for the exhibition and keeping of poultry.

The Machine Shop is three hundred feet long, with shafting the full length, and furnished with a steam engine for testing all kinds of machinery.

The Cottage, a perfect gem as an architectural design, contains four saloons, which are well furnished for the comfort and convenience of the ladies.

The Agricultural Department, one hundred and sixty-one feet long and fifty feet wide, will give the farmers an opportunity to sit down and examine all the modern machinery lately invented.

The Music Hall, a building eighty feet long and forty feet wide, is erected exclusively for the display of musical instruments.

There have also been built 400 covered stalls for horses and cattle, and 100 covered pens for hogs and sheep.

At all times, except during Fair week, parties can visit the grounds by paying an admission fee of ten cents each.

---

## Missouri Botanical Gardens,

Or "Shaw's Place," situated on Tower Grove avenue, at the junction of Floral avenue, an elevated site overlooking the city from the west, and a wide range of beautiful surrounding country, will be found probably the finest gardens in the United States. Here is a congress of the whole vegetable world—palm, and pine, and cactus; all the oaks and the mistletoes; the representatives of Arizona, all seated side by side; every species of grass, grain, bulb and tuber; also the conservatories of tropical plants and the museum of rare specimens.

This splendid experiment of Mr. Shaw pays him nothing but the thanks of his delighted visitors. Here is education, religion, health and happiness combined.

The gardens are divided into three sections, as follows:

The Herbaceous and Flower Garden, embracing ten acres, contains almost every flower that can be grown in this latitude, and also contains several plant houses, in which are thousands of exotic and tropical plants. From the neat octagon pavilion or summer house, near the centre, a comprehensive view is obtained of the whole grounds and surrounding country.

In the Fruiticetum, or Experimental Fruit Garden, comprising six acres, are cultivated all the various kinds of fruit which grow in the open air in this climate, including forty kinds of grapes, twenty of strawberries, and all other kinds and varieties.

The Arboretum, comprising twenty-five acres, embraces all kinds of ornamental and forest trees. In this section is the Pinetum, containing all coniferous trees that will grow in this climate—of pines alone twenty-nine species; and the Quercetum, embracing all the varieties of the oak, and the Salictum, embracing about one hundred species of the willow.

The Labyrinth, or Maze, is an intricate, winding, puzzling hedge-bordered pathway, leading to the summer house in the centre. The hedges embrace all varieties, and are kept clipped and in good order.

The Private Garden, where the graperies are situated, is in the rear of the house. The neat, yet substantial fire-proof building, east of Mr. Shaw's residence, is devoted to the Museum, Herbarium and Botanical Library, on the main floor, the Reading and Lecture Room being in the basement.

The improvements were commenced by Mr. Heary Shaw about 1857, with a design to establish an institution for the promotion of the sciences of Botany and Horticulture. To a life of business the proprietor has added this life-study of fruits and flowers. The high appreciation by the public of his princely liberality in the conception of so noble an endeavor, and the veneration and respect they entertain for the man who thus devotes years of labor and thousands of dollars annually to this singularly laudable enterprise, is daily and hourly manifested by the scores and hundreds of our citizens and strangers who visit this model garden. The massive stone walls and huge iron gates are not closed against any who observe the rules of the garden.

Visitors are admitted daily, from sunrise to sunset, except on Sundays and holidays; then after two o'clock P. M. The average number of visitors is about six thousand per month; and while this is the most fashionable, pleasant and popular place of resort, open to all respectably attired and well-behaved persons free, the proprietor expresses himself in warm terms with the general good order and deportment of visitors.

Every visitor leaves the garden reluctantly, and is better for having been there, and the hour spent there will never be forgotten. All revere the man through whose liberality this work has been so admirably planned, and thoroughly and systematically executed.

### **Hackney Carriages.**

#### **RATES OF FARE.**

*First*—For conveying one or more passengers a distance not exceeding one mile, one dollar.

*Second*—For the use of any hackney carriage or wagon by the hour, with one or more passengers, with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping as often as required, two dollars for the first hour, and one dollar and a half for each succeeding hour.

---

### Baggage Wagons.

For hauling ten blocks, forty cents. Any distance over ten blocks shall be according to agreement. If there is no agreement, the charge to be in the same proportion that ten blocks is to forty cents.

Any owner or driver of a vehicle who, when required, shall fail, neglect, or refuse to convey any passenger or his baggage, unless at the time actually otherwise employed, and any such person who shall demand for conveying persons or property more than the sums allowed by this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay not less than \$5 nor more than \$100. (According to Ordinance 5411, Article 1, Section 17.)

The owners or drivers of all hackney carriages, or other vehicles, used for transportation of persons, shall keep a copy of the above placed conspicuously in said vehicles.
